No. 6.—Consolidated Revenue—Expenditure and Receipts CLASSIFIED ACCORDING TO FUNCTION, 1949-50 and 1950-51.

The general purport of this table is to show the net cost, including the relevant portion of Public Debt service, of each function of Government, irrespective of the department or departments administering such functions. It should be noted that *Expenditure on Hospitals* is met mainly from the Hospital Trust Fund, into which are paid annual amounts which are allocated to the fund under *State Grants (Tax Reimbursement) Acts*. Receipts shown for the *Item Roads and Bridges* comprise interest and sinking fund paid by the Main Roads Board on loan capital advanced by the Treasurer in respect to certain Metropolitan roads. *Rural and Industries Bank* expenditure from Consolidated Revenue is confined to meeting Public Debt charges. The receipts shown represent the Bank's contribution towards interest and sinking fund on loan capital advanced by the Treasurer. Receipts shown for the *Item Navigation, Harbours and Lights* represent, largely, contributions by the Fremantle Harbour Trust on account of interest and sinking fund on loan capital, together with surplus profits. Expenditure from consolidated revenue in respect to the *Metropolitan Market Trust*, the *State Housing Commission* and certain *Business Undertakings* such as the *State Electricity Commission* and *Charcoal Iron and Steel Industry* covers only Public Debt Charges, and receipts shown represent amounts paid to revenue on account of such charges, current or accrued.

TRADE OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

Year ended 30th June, 1951.

In the following summary of the external trade of Western Australia all values are given in Australian currency, and figures in parenthesis refer to the previous year.

1.—Summary.

The outstanding feature of the State's external trade during 1950-51 was the spectacular rise in the value of overseas exports due to inflated wool prices and heavier wheat and flour shipments. While the total value of exports rose to £111,857,881 (£61,865,636) the rise in imports—from £69,443,677 to £88,172,421—was moderate and the year's trading resulted in a favourable balance of £23,685,460 compared with an adverse balance of £7,578,041 in the previous year. The favourable balance with overseas countries was £61,938,009 (£21,106,310) but was largely offset by an adverse balance of £38,252,549 (£28,684,351) from trade with other States of the Commonwealth.

2.—Imports.

The total value of external purchases during 1950-51 was £88,172,421, an increase of £18,728,744 or 27 per cent. on the previous year. Imports from the other States of the Commonwealth, which were valued at £47,914,007, increased by £12,892,121 while imports from overseas countries rose by £5,836,623 to £40,258,414.

The principal States from which Australian goods were purchased were Victoria, £20,878,020 (£15,865,790); New South Wales, £16,063,261 (£11,008,515); South Australia, £6,379,175 (£4,390,966); and Queensland, £1,952,311 (£1,574,426). Purchases from the United Kingdom totalled £20,625,644 (£18,944,881), while other important suppliers amongst British countries were India, £2,146,588 (£2,174,125); Singapore, £1,926,188 (£1,519,190); Ceylon, £737,083 (£467,047); Christmas Island, £850,624 (£694,003); and Canada, £637,804 (£641,923). Imports from foreign countries totalled £13,712,936 (£10,345,694), the principal suppliers being Persia, £2,396,594 (£1,276,539); Indonesia, £2,353,295 (£2,171,459); United States of America, £1,982,433 (£2,847,232); Italy, £1,331,219 (£955,540); and Japan, £1,068,788 (£431,352).

While the values of most items imported during the year were higher than in 1949-50, many of the increases are undoubtedly due to price rises and do not represent additional volume of imports. For instance, the import of Motor Vehicles and Parts, which has rapidly increased over the post-war years, appears to have levelled off and the increase during 1950-51 was probably due almost entirely to price rises. The total value was £7,926,114 (£7,589,820). Also, although the upward trend in the value of machinery imports was maintained, the total being £15,332,114 compared with £13,128,652 in 1949-50, it is doubtful whether more machinery came into the State than in the previous year.

However, the volume of Iron and Steel imports increased to 88,564 tons (58,660 tons) valued at £4,323,043 (£2,519,654), of which 45,981 tons valued at £2,663,949 came from overseas sources and 42,583 tons for £1,659,094 from the other States of the Commonwealth. In the previous year 23,954 tons valued at £1,358,930 were purchased overseas and 34,706 tons for £1,160,724 from other States. Imports of Petroleum and Shale Spirit increased to 50,457,829 gallons (43,789,667 gallons) for an f.o.b. value of £2,922,862 (£2,162,933) and Solar and Residual Oil, used extensively for ships' bunkerings, totalled 130,552,769 gallons for £3,615,684 compared with 97,864,466 gallons for £2,382,086 in 1949-50.

Other items for which increased import values were recorded were Meats Preserved in Tins, £285,712 (£197,241); Butter, £277,096 (£56,398); Barley, £138,739 (£18,333); Jams and Jellies, £279,495 (£173,261); Tea, £996,737 (£716,670); Confectionery, £841,866 (£657,761); Cigarettes, £1,037,551 (£857,661); Greasy Wool, £984,402 (£580,419); Blankets and Rugs, £283,425 (£170,785); Piece Goods, £4,197,246 (£3,414,355); Floor Coverings, £1,062,629 (£638,479); Apparel, £6,697,371 (£5,450,083); Sulphur, £827,679 (£663,903); Tyres and Tubes, £2,232,483 (£1,494,084).

Important items in which decreases occurred during the year were Rock Phosphates, 274,985 tons (291,854 tons), £917,187 (£1,010,616); Mineral Lubricating Oil, 3,758,354 gallons (4,127,392 gallons), £592,523 (£611,634); Bags and Sacks, 579,962 dozen (806,346 dozen), £1,270,865 (£1,488,605); Coal, 79,703 tons (103,648 tons), £272,935 (£298,422); and Plywood and Veneers, 2,559,665 sq. feet (3,959,854 sq. feet), £75,526 (£117,342).

3.—Exports.

The total value of exports, including stores supplied to overseas and interstate vessels, was £111,857,881 compared with £61,865,636 in 1949-50. The increase was mainly due to a rise of £30,817,895 in the value of wool exports and an additional £10,871,442 realised from external sales of wheat and flour. The greater part of the increase occurred in trade with overseas countries which totalled £102,196,423 (£55,528,101) compared with only £9,661,458 (£6,337,535) for exports to other States of the Commonwealth.

Exports to the United Kingdom were valued at £34,475,348 (£18,185,225) and, as very little increase took place in the value of imports, the result was a balance of £13,849,704 in the State's favour compared with a deficit of £759,656 in 1949-50. Principal exports to the United Kingdom were wool, wheat and flour.

Goods valued at £9,390,134 (£6,210,525) were sent to the other States of the Commonwealth. The principal States supplied were Victoria, £3,891,035 (£2,868,189); South Australia, £2,523,243 (£1,391,063); and New South Wales, £2,035,833 (£1,372,896), and the more important commodities were wool, timber, clover seed, fish, potatoes, tomatoes and asbestos fibre.

Exports to Other British countries increased only slightly, the total value being £16,599,795 compared with £15,385,461 in the previous year. The value of goods (mainly wheat and flour) sent to India was £6,493,535 (£8,892,085) while Singapore was supplied with a wide range of commodities valued at £3,375,739 (£1,607,223). Other British Commonwealth countries which were important buyers of Western Australian products were Ceylon, £1,570,886 (£1,157,107); Canada, £1,515,649 (£277,840) and Malaya, £1,411,226 (£1,432,123). The principal commodities exported were flour to Ceylon, wool to Canada, and condensed milk, flour, sandalwood and oatmeal and rolled oats to Malaya.

The United States of America, with purchases valued at £13,191,347 (£3,630,869) was the most important foreign market for the State's exports. £12,043,312 represented sales of greasy and scoured wool and other items worthy of note were frozen crayfish tails, £744,321; pearlshell, £113,743 and hides and skins, £112,792. Trade with the United States of America favoured Western Australia to the extent of £11,208,914.

Other foreign countries to which substantial sales were made were France, £6,830,119 (£2,450,740); Egypt, £6,170,671 (£2,635,239); Italy, £4,906,385 (£571,738); Belgium, £4,629,332 (£1,816,866); and Germany, £3,259,378 (£1,077,203). Exports to France included greasy and scoured wool valued at £5,505,895 and sheepskins worth £1,322,854. The value of wheat and flour sent to Egypt was £6,085,104 and sales to Italy consisted principally of wheat, £3,147,699 and wool, £1,732,693. Wool, hides, skins and oats were supplied to Belgium, and wheat, wool and whale oil to Germany.

Notes on the principal exports are given hereunder:—

Wool, Greasy.—In 1950 keen competition by English, American and Continental buyers for Australian wool caused sharp rises in wool prices which resulted in a record average f.o.b. value of 143·4d. for greasy wool exported from this State during 1950-51. This figure was more than double the 1949-50 average of 57·6d. Although the volume exported declined from 83,405,237 lb. in 1949-50 to 80,731,643 lb. in the year under review, the amount realised rose from £20,035,466 to £48,246,541.

The United Kingdom, which purchased 35,205,094 lb. for £20,998,246, was again the leading buyer of Western Australian wool. Other important purchases were made by the United States of America, 14,939,517 lb., £10,415,487; France, 8,989,351 lb., £4,932,667; and Belgium, 7,680,422 lb., £3,845,061.

Wool, Scoured.—11,054,717 lb. of scoured wool exported during 1950-51 realised £8,032,936 compared with 17,490,562 lb. for £5,426,116 in the previous year, and the average f.o.b. value was 174·4d. (74·5d.).

The principal countries to which scoured wool was supplied were the United Kingdom, 2,770,869 lb., £1,874,290; United States of America, 1,773,776 lb., £1,627,825; Canada, 1,189,384 lb., £813,203; France, 806,579 lb., £573,228 and Italy, 540,009 lb., £516,129.

Wheat.—Wheat exports totalled 30,510,323 bushels for £25,843,906 and the average f.o.b. value per bushel was 16s. 11d. The equivalent figures for 1949-50 were 21,510,390 bushels, £16,692,007 and 15s. 6d.

8,727,973 bushels valued at £6,665,531 were sold to the United Kingdom; 6,356,037 bushels for £5,802,972 to Egypt; 6,517,915 bushels for £5,689,585 to India, and 3,469,797 bushels for £3,147,699 to Italy.

Flour (Wheat).—The volume of flour exports increased from 2,316,287 centials in 1949-50 to 3,194,796 centials in 1950-51, the values for the two years being £4,167,598 and £5,887,141 respectively.

The principal overseas markets were Ceylon, 789,108 centials, £1,447,515; Singapore, 557,289 centials, £1,085,895; Malaya, 432,595 centials, £853,782; India, 396,989 centials, £700,710; and Indonesia, 303,023 centials, £587,258.

Timber.—Overseas exports of timber totalled 8,902,613 super feet, valued at £374,867 compared with 11,324,081 super feet for £450,638 in the previous year. 3,222,031 super feet valued at £146,069 were supplied to the United Kingdom and 3,954,233 super feet for £159,728 to South Africa.

Shipments to the other States of the Commonwealth declined from 22,971,259 super feet to 19,207,289 super feet valued at £516,655 (£523,855).

Apples.—The United Kingdom, which purchased 252,705 bushels (126,529 bushels) valued at £277,285 (£104,307), was the principal oversea buyer of Western Australian apples. The only other important customers were Singapore, 175,658 bushels for £248,493 and Sweden, 177,606 bushels for £205,764. 82,583 bushels valued at £83,531 were exported to the other States of the Commonwealth.

The total export of apples for the year was 724,712 bushels (707,138 bushels) for an f.o.b. value of £865,034 (£670,686).

Fish.—Recorded exports of fish rose from 3,306,551 lb. valued at £423,995 to 5,126,919 lb. valued at £932,321. However, these figures do not provide a true indication of the trend of the export trade as shipments of almost one million lb. of frozen crayfish tails were recorded during July and August, 1950, part of which represented carry-over from the previous year.

The total given above includes 3,165,055 lb. of crayfish tails valued at £758,706, of which the United States of America purchased 3,066,793 lb. for £744,321.

Beef.—Exports of frozen beef totalled 16,960,592 lb. (18,993,314 lb.) for an f.o.b. value of £609,816 (£590,718).

The principal markets were the United Kingdom, 16,223,257 lb., £578,942, and Singapore, 707,683 lb. for £27,787.

PART IV.—TRADE, TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATION.

I.—TRADE AND CUSTOMS.

Prior to the 15th November, 1947, Oversea Imports were valued in British currency and represented the F.O.B. value at Port of Shipment plus the statutory 10 per cent. imposed for value for duty purposes, in accordance with the Customs Act. From the 15th November, 1947, following an amendment to the Act, Oversea Imports have been valued in Australian currency F.O.B. Port of Shipment. In this Register all Oversea Imports are valued on the revised basis (values for the periods prior to 15th November, 1947, being re-computed) and, as Interstate Imports and all Exports have always been recorded in Australian currency, the values throughout are now expressed in uniform terms.

On all Interstate Imports 10 per cent. has been added to the F.O.B. value at the port of shipment.

Note B.—The “quantity” columns are left blank in all cases where the quantities declared are packages of an irregular or unrecognised size, and consequently do not indicate the number, capacity, or weight of articles imported.

Note C.—The following abbreviation is used throughout this table:—

N.E.I. means “Not elsewhere included.”



VI.—VALUE OF PRODUCTION.

NET VALUE—

The Annual Net Value of Production represents the sum available each year for distribution among those concerned in industry, i.e., workers, proprietors (including landlords), and providers of capital.

In combining industries this is the value that is used in order to avoid the inevitable duplication that would result if "Gross" or "Local" values were aggregated.

I. PRIMARY PRODUCTION.

- (a) *Gross Value* is the value placed on recorded production at the wholesale price realised "at the principal market." In cases where primary products are consumed at the place of production or where they become raw material for a secondary industry, these points of consumption are taken as the "principal market."
- (b) *Marketing Costs*, which are deducted from "Gross Value" to obtain "Local Value," comprise Freight, Cost of Containers, Commission, and other handling charges.
- (c) *Local Value* is the value recorded at the place of production, and is obtained by deducting "Marketing Costs" from "Gross Value."
- (d) *The Value of Goods Consumed in the Process of Production* covers seed and fertilizers used, pickling, sprays, dips, fodder consumed, fuel and oil, repairs, and similar costs, and is deducted from "Local Value" to obtain "Net Value."
- (e) *Net Value* represents the return to the producer (farmer, pastoralist, mine owner, etc.) after deducting from "Local Value" the "Value of goods consumed in the process of production." Such return is the sum available for payment of wages, interest, rent, and producer's own income.

II. MANUFACTURING.

The initial value taken is that of Output "at factory door." The *Net Value of Manufacturing*, comparable with the net value of primary production, is the value added during the course of manufacture or treatment and is computed by deducting from output value the value of "goods consumed in process of production," viz.: materials used; power, fuel and light; repairs, lubricating oil and water; containers, packing, etc. In other words, it represents the sum available to the manufacturer for providing for wages, rent, interest, depreciation, certain other costs (such as advertising and insurance), and for his own income.

III. GENERAL.

- (a) To secure a proper appreciation of the value of production as set out in the following tables it is well to keep in mind the following considerations:—The sum of the gross values of the several agents of production contains substantial duplications. The total value realised for a season's wheat, for instance, includes costs of transport, commission, and other handling charges, which items form the incomes of those performing these services. Similarly, the Local Value includes value of fertiliser, etc., used, which item will have been included in the value of manufactured production. Again, fodder grown and valued as an agricultural product would also, if fed to milch cows, be duplicated in the value of dairy production. When, however, *net* values are being ascertained, the value of such fodder consumed is deducted as a cost against dairying, thus eliminating duplication. Thus, while Gross Value represents a very accurate estimate of the value of the production of any particular industry, *only Net Values should be aggregated in arriving at a total value of "All Recorded Production."* The ratio of Marketing Costs to Gross Value of Production varies greatly as between industries. Thus, the great bulk of forestry production sustains no marketing costs, as the logs form raw material for a secondary industry (saw-milling) without being "marketed." For this reason all forest products were valued prior to the year 1933-34 at place of production before any marketing costs were incurred. Commencing with 1933-34, however, marketing costs, together with cost of goods consumed in process of production, have been taken into account where actually incurred. In any case, the statement of net values is not affected and is comparable throughout.
- (b) As a proportion of *all* production, *recorded* production varies somewhat from year to year. On the average, total net recorded production represents slightly more than half of the net value of all goods and services produced in Western Australia.

No. 42.—Value of Production—Decennial Summary 1941-42 to 1950-51.

PART VI.—FACTORY STATISTICS.

DEFINITION.—For Statistical purposes a Factory is an industrial establishment in which four or more hands are employed, or motive power is used in the process of manufacturing, assembling, treating or repairing.

SPECIAL NOTES.—

(1) *Unless otherwise stated, figures for "Employment" include particulars of "Working Proprietors," and relate to the period of operation, which is not in all cases for the full twelve months. Contrawise particulars for "Salaries and Wages" exclude the value of "Working Proprietors" services.*

(2) *The Net Value of Manufacturing, shown herein as "Value of Production" or "Net Production," is the value added in the course of manufacture. It is derived from Output by deducting the value of goods consumed (viz., materials used; fuel, power, and light; lubricating oil; repairs to plant; containers, packings, etc.) and represents the sum available for payment of wages, rent, interest, depreciation, other overhead costs and for the manufacturer's own income.*

PART XII.—RETAIL PRICES, WAGES, EMPLOYMENT, AND MISCELLANEOUS.

I.—RETAIL PRICES

This section gives details of Retail Prices, Consumption of Foodstuffs, etc., and Retail Price Index Numbers.

RETAIL PRICES.

Retail Prices of selected groups of commodities and services are collected regularly by the Government Statistician from representative informants in the more important towns of Western Australia.

From 6 towns, prices are obtained for regimens covering (a) 41 items of Food and Groceries, (b) Rents of 4 and 5-roomed Houses, (c) 80 items of Adult and Juvenile Clothing, and (d) 27 items of Household Drapery and Utensils, and in addition, other items of Miscellaneous Expenditure, such as Fuel and Light. Prices of Food and Groceries only are collected from a more extensive list of towns. Informants are required to furnish prices monthly (prices as at the middle of the month) for Food and Groceries and quarterly (particulars as at the 15th of the middle month of each quarter) for House Rents, Clothing, and Miscellaneous items.

Specific grades and qualities have been established for the various items included in the regimen in order to ensure that all informants throughout the State shall quote consistently for articles of the same standard. The collection of data in the Metropolitan Area, Kalgoorlie-Boulder, Northam, Bunbury, and Geraldton—the “five towns” of Western Australia in the several Commonwealth retail price index series—is made under the authority of the Commonwealth Census and Statistics Act, 1905–1949. The State Statistical Department directly supervises the collection of data for the Commonwealth Statistician. The actual collection of returns is carried out by specially qualified field officers of the Commonwealth Bureau of Census and Statistics, who are attached to the State Department. These officers check prices and standards in the shops of informants, and inspect houses listed on the rent returns.

In those towns where returns are required under the State Statistics Act, 1907, the method of collection is substantially the same as that outlined above.

During the war years 1939–45 unusual difficulty was experienced in obtaining prices for the compilation of several of the abovementioned series, due mainly to the scarcity and sporadic supply of certain types of goods and to changes in the grade and quality of such. Difficulties were most pronounced in the case of the clothing section and the household drapery and utensils section of the miscellaneous series, necessitating in some cases the substitution of new grades, qualities or types of articles for those formerly included in the regimen, or again the adoption of various statistical devices to overcome the effects of the absence of quotations for goods temporarily off the market or in short supply.

In some measure the problem has remained under post-war conditions, as some goods are still in short supply and stocks are extremely variable. It should be noted, however, that all practicable steps are taken to preserve the statistical integrity of the index.

Food and Groceries.

The regimen of Food and Groceries commodities adopted for the several index series issued by the Australian Statisticians is set out in Table No. 1. This shows the average prices quoted by retailers in the Metropolitan Area during each month of 1951.

CONSUMPTION OF FOODSTUFFS, ETC.

No. 2.—Estimated Annual Consumption of Foodstuffs, Beverages and Tobacco.

Details of the estimated annual consumption of some of the more important food commodities consumed in Western Australia are shown in this table. Particulars of the consumption of spirituous and alcoholic liquors and tobacco preparations are also given.

The figures have been derived from records of production, imports and exports, for the years 1946-47 to 1950-51, and show the average amounts consumed annually per head of population during that period. They include quantities used in manufacturing, such as flour in biscuits, bread, etc.; sugar in jam, and so on.

Where the necessary data were available, adjustment has been made for movement in stocks, and for exports as ships' stores.

RETAIL PRICE INDEX NUMBERS.

In this section are shown Index numbers computed from retail prices returns furnished by informants in the more important towns of the State.

These Index numbers cover selected "regimens" (or lists of commodities or services) comprising items of—

- I.—Food and Groceries,
- II.—Housing (Rents of 4 and 5-roomed Houses),
- III.—Clothing, and
- IV.—Miscellaneous Household Expenditure,

as well as combined regimens of Food, Groceries, and Housing (Groups I. and II.), and "All Items of Household Expenditure" (Groups I. to IV. inclusive)—the "B" and "C" ("All Items") Index Series respectively, of the Commonwealth Statistician.

The several Index series simply measure variations in the aggregate cost of a given regimen of commodities at various intervals of time or as between different towns, and are intended for use as approximate measures of general retail price movements in the commodity classes to which they refer. In this connection it cannot be too strongly emphasised that they do not, and are not, intended to measure an absolute "cost of living," *vide* Commonwealth Statistician's Labour Report No. 21, Appendix "Wages and Prices," page 167.

In the series set out in the following pages the Index numbers themselves represent the several "aggregates" expressed as relatives of the weighted average "aggregate cost" of the same regimen in the six capital cities over some specific interval of time, *e.g.*, the five years 1923 to 1927.

To ensure that the series shall be as reliable as possible, the commodities comprising the complete regimen have been selected to conform to the following conditions:—

1. They must be such that they can be clearly and definitely described.
2. They must be capable of standardisation, and mean the same thing at different times and places.
3. They must not be subject to violent or extreme seasonal fluctuations (hence, in general, fresh fruit and vegetables are excluded from the regimen).
4. They must be in common use, and their usage must comprise an appreciable proportion of the total consumption of the commodity group to which they relate, and moreover, remain relatively constant.
5. On the whole, they must be a fair sample of the commodity group which they purport to represent.

These persons are taken as representative respectively of men over seventeen years, women over seventeen years, children ten to sixteen years, children five to nine years, and children under five years.

Within each section, the items are weighted according to their relative consumption by the type of person concerned, and the sectional aggregates themselves are brought together in one composite aggregate after they have been weighted in accordance with an appropriate population factor. This factor represents the proportion which each age group bears to the total population.

II.—WAGES.

No. 21.—State Basic Wage.

Under the provisions of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-50, authority is vested in the State Court of Arbitration to declare an annual Basic Wage, which, until 1950, was operative from the 1st of July each year.

The first decision of the Court took effect on the 1st July, 1926, and prescribed a rate of £4 5s. 0d. for males and £2 5s. 11d. for females throughout the whole of the State. In fixing the male rate, the Court divided the wage into four elements, viz., Food and Groceries, Rent, Clothing and Miscellaneous Expenditure, and allowed amounts for each of these elements to meet the requirements of a family unit of four, comprising a man, his wife and two children. For Food and Groceries the amount was equivalent to the Piddington Commission's standard for this section (reduced to provide for a family unit of four); for Rent, the average rental of four and five-roomed houses; for Clothing, an amount approximating the sum fixed for such expenditure by the New South Wales Board of Trade in 1925, and for Miscellaneous an amount based on the Piddington Commission's finding.

These rates remained unaltered until the 1st July, 1929, when the amounts were increased to £4 7s. 0d. and £2 7s. 0d. respectively, with the exception of certain specified goldfields areas, in respect of which the previous wage was retained.

A revision by the Court following the 1930 inquiry resulted in the declaration of a separate wage of £4 6s. 0d. for males and £2 6s. 5d. for females, in respect of the Metropolitan Area, and rates of £4 5s. 0d. and £2 5s. 11d. respectively for all other parts of the State.

Additional power was given the Court under the provisions of the Industrial Arbitration Act Amendment Act, 1930, to enable quarterly adjustments to be made to the annual declaration, and on the 3rd March, 1931, rates of £3 18s. 0d. for males and £2 2s. 2d. for females were prescribed for the Metropolitan Area, while all other parts of the State were fixed at £3 17s. 0d. and £2 1s. 8d. respectively.

The annual declaration operative as from the 1st July, 1931, did not vary these amounts, but a further quarterly adjustment on the 18th August, 1931, marked the inauguration of a different wage for agricultural areas, which are taken to be those areas comprised within the official South-West Land Division as gazetted under the Land Act.

Wage levels in all divisions of the State were considerably increased as from the 1st July, 1938, following the most comprehensive inquiry since the original declaration. In the course of the 1938 inquiry, special consideration was given to the factors of National Income and Standard of Nutrition. In the case of the Rent and Miscellaneous elements of the wage the "old" standards remained unchanged. For Clothing, however, the Court adopted the Piddington "standard"—reduced to provide for a family unit of four—and for Food and Groceries, the Piddington standard plus an amount of 1s.

At a sitting of the Court held on 26th February, 1942, to consider the quarterly adjustment of the basic wage, the Court decided that, in the light of existing economic conditions, there should be no alteration to the rates then in force. This decision marked the first occasion upon which the Court, in the exercise of the discretionary powers conferred upon it under the Act, had refrained from making a quarterly adjustment to the wage to equate its purchasing power to the "standards" of the relevant annual declaration. It was followed by a similar decision given on 29th April, 1942, when the Court reaffirmed that no adjustment would be made to existing rates, despite further increases in retail prices.

On 11th June, 1942, the Court in its annual declaration adopted the rates which had operated since 28th July, 1941, as its new base, and these remained in force until 8th August, 1942, when they were superseded by a Basic Wage Adjustment Order made by the Premier on 7th August under the authority of National Security (Economic Organisation) Regulations. The rates established under this Order were substantially the current equivalents of the standards adopted by the Court in its annual declarations, 1938-1941.

These standards were re-adopted by the Court for the purposes of the quarterly adjustments made on the 30th October, 1942, and subsequently until the Court's Interim Basic Wage Declaration of the 26th February, 1947. In this declaration which was made under powers conferred by an amendment (December, 1946) to National Security (Economic Organisation) Regulations the basic wage was increased by a loading of 5s. This loading was varied proportionately to the remainder of the basic wage in subsequent declarations and quarterly adjustments.

The Industrial Arbitration Act Amendment Act of 1950 provided, *inter alia*, (1) that basic wage determinations may be made at any time during the year at intervals of not less than twelve months subject only to quarterly adjustments and (2) that in such determination the Court must give due consideration to the economic capacity of industry. Pursuant to this enactment and subsequent to the judgment of the Commonwealth Court, the State Court increased the basic wage in all Divisions by £1 for males and 15s. for females as from the 18th December, 1950. It also decided in February, 1951, that subsequent quarterly adjustments should be based on variations in the "C" Series (All Items) Retail Prices Index Numbers. On the 28th November, 1951, the Court declared the Basic Wage for females at 65 per cent. of the male rate, to operate as from the 1st December, 1951.

The following table shows annual declarations and certain interim variations since the original decision of 1926, which remained unaltered until 1st July, 1929.

No. 22—Commonwealth Basic Wage.

By an amendment of 1949 to the Commonwealth Conciliation and Arbitration Act, the basic wage for an adult male worker is defined in Section 25 as "that wage, or that part of a wage, which is just and reasonable for an adult male, without regard to any circumstance pertaining to the work upon which, or the industry in which, he is employed." The section contains a similar definition of a basic wage for females. Before the inclusion of this amendment, the Act empowered the Court to prescribe a "minimum rate of wage" but it neither defined, nor provided for the determination of, a specific "basic wage." In general terms, however, the basic wage was understood to be identifiable as the minimum wage (including "loadings") payable to an adult unskilled labourer. (A "loading" may be defined as an addition to the "basic" wage as compensation for some peculiar condition of labour or environment or other circumstance, and not by way of "margin for skill.")

The history of the Commonwealth basic wage is summarized below :—

(1) Until 1934, rates were based on the "Harvester" judgment delivered by Mr. Justice Higgins in 1907, which fixed 42s. per week for Melbourne as a reasonable amount to meet the needs of "a family of about five."

From 1913 up to the end of 1921, the basic wage was simply a "Harvester" equivalent, rates being fixed by varying the original Harvester wage in accordance with movements in the purchasing power of money as disclosed by the Commonwealth Statistician's "A" Series index numbers covering items of food and groceries and rents of "all houses." Up to 1918 the Court, in computing "Harvester" equivalents, used the index numbers for the previous calendar year. From 1918 to the end of 1921 the figures for the next preceding four quarters were used, and from 1921 onwards the index numbers for the latest quarter available. In that year the Court began to insert provisions in awards for the automatic adjustment of wages according to quarterly movements in the "A" Series index, and a loading—subsequently known as the "Powers 3s."—was added to the "Harvester" equivalent by Mr. Justice Powers to ensure that over a period of rapidly rising prices the worker would suffer no loss of real wages in the interval between the adjustment of rates.

The method of fixation and adjustment remained unaltered until after the onset of the depression. Then in 1931 the Court, having satisfied itself that unfavourable economic conditions prevented the maintenance of real wages at their existing level, directed that, with certain exceptions, all wages under its jurisdiction should be reduced by 10 per cent. as from the 1st February of that year.

In its judgment of May, 1933, the Court concluded that the method of adjusting wages to conform to variations in the "A" Series index numbers had resulted in a decrease of real wages beyond the prescribed percentage. To correct this movement it adopted the use of the "D" Series index.

(2) In a judgment delivered in April, 1934, the Court introduced an entirely new basis for the fixation of the basic wage. The "Harvester" standard supplemented by the Powers loading was discarded and a fresh starting point selected. The new wage was largely founded upon a declaration of 84s. per week made by the New South Wales Board of Trade in August, 1925. As this amount took into consideration the upward tendency of prices, the Court regarded the rate as applicable to the year 1926. The "C" Series index number for Sydney for that year was 1033, and for the December quarter of 1933 stood at 829. Thus an amount of 84s. in 1926 had the same purchasing power as 67s. in 1933, which became the rate applicable in Sydney from the 1st May, 1934. The equation of this wage to the index number 829 established the relationship, $1000 \text{ in the "C" Series index} = 81\text{s. in the wage}$ and, by applying the factor 0.081 to the "C" Series index number for any town or group of towns at any time, the wage in shillings could be readily computed. Owing to adverse industrial conditions in South Australia and Tasmania, the new rates for Hobart and Adelaide were graduated so as not to come into full operation until the 1st June, 1935. The date on which future periodical adjustments were to become operative was altered to the first pay period in the months of June, September, December and March. Adjustments were continued on this basis until 1940, since when they have taken effect from the beginning of the second month after the end of each quarter.

(3) The hearing of a claim by the combined unions for an increase in the basic wage was concluded in June, 1937. The Court, in fixing a new rate, transferred the basis of the adjustment of wages from the "C" Series to a special "Court" Series based upon the relationship between wages and index numbers which had been established in 1934. This Court Series was, in effect, nothing more than a table expressing in shillings the wage rates derived by the use of the conversion factor 0.081. The Court's judgment further provided for the addition of "prosperity loadings" to the rates so derived, which came to be designated the "needs portion" of the wage. The amount of the loading applied to the "needs" wage for Sydney, Melbourne and Brisbane was 6s., for Adelaide, Perth and Hobart, 4s. and for the Six Capital Cities as a whole, 5s.

(4) In general, the method of the 1937 judgment was retained by the Court until its "interim" decision of the 13th December, 1946 when, in granting an increase of 7s. per week in the "needs" portion of the wage, it inaugurated a Court Index (Second Series). In fixing the base of this

new series, the "C" Series index number (1146) for the Six Capital Cities as a whole in the September quarter, 1946 was equated to the "needs" portion (100s.) of the new Six Capitals wage. This established the base, 1000 in the "C" Series index = 87s. in the wage. The immediate monetary effect was to increase by 7s. per week the "needs" wage in each of the capital cities with the exception of Hobart, where the increase was 6s. The prosperity loadings were retained at their original levels.

(5) On the application early in 1949 of certain unions seeking, among other things, an increase in the basic wage the Court, after an exhaustive examination of the Australian economy, declared a general increase of 20s. per week. Judgment was delivered on the 12th October, 1950, the new rates to be operative from the first pay period in December. The Court also introduced a Court Index (Third Series) based upon the equation of 1572 (the "C" Series index number for the Six Capital Cities as a whole in the September quarter, 1950) to 162s., the increased weighted average wage for the Six Capitals (made up of the "needs" portion 137s., plus a uniform prosperity loading of 5s., plus the additional 20s. awarded by the Court). In this way, 1000 in the "C" Series index became equal to 103s. in the wage. In determining the new rate of payment, a uniform amount of 25s. was added to the existing "needs" basic wage, with the concurrent discontinuance of the prosperity loading as a separate entity. This had the effect of increasing the basic wage in Sydney, Melbourne and Brisbane by 19s., in Adelaide, Perth and Hobart by 21s., and for the Six Capital Cities as a whole by 20s. From, and including, the first pay period in February, 1951 the rates so determined were to be subject in their entirety to quarterly adjustment in accordance with movements in the Court Index (Third Series). Thus the components "needs portion" and "prosperity loading" ceased to exist as separate and distinguishable parts of the wage.

Commonwealth Basic Wage rates (including "prosperity loadings") payable in each of the capital cities since 1934 are shown in the following table:—

No. 25.—Classification of Population by Occupation and Industry—Census, 30th June, 1947.

In order to obtain accurate statistical analysis of the economic and social structure of the community, the occupied population must be classified in at least two ways, according to two distinct concepts :—

- (i) The industry, trade or organised service of which each person forms a unit ;
- (ii) The individual occupation or function of the person within the industry through which his services are rendered.

The distinction between the terms *industry* and *occupation* is not always sufficiently appreciated, and frequently the terms are used as if they were synonymous. In view of the importance of a clear understanding of these terms in their relation to the classification of the population in its working capacity, it is desirable to define the sense in which they are used for statistical purposes :—

Industry is defined as any single branch of productive activity, trade or service. It is concerned with the activities of persons, firms or businesses *considered as a group* producing the same commodity, performing the same process or providing the same service. All persons engaged in any such sphere of economic activity are classified industrially as belonging to the particular branch in question *irrespective of their personal occupation* within the industry. *Examples* : Building, Hotel-keeping, Sheep-raising, Gold Mining, Engineering, Medicine.

Occupation is defined as the nature of the work which a person performs, and implies *personal* performance. It may be based on the material treated, the process carried out or the type of service rendered by an individual worker. *Examples* : Carpenter, Steward, Shearer, Mullocker, Moulder, Surgeon.

The distinction between the two concepts can further be sharpened by keeping in mind certain important objects in classifying the occupied population :—

- (i) One of the objects of *classification by industries* is to show the absolute and relative importance of the various branches of industry. For that purpose a person's industrial classification is determined by reference to the business, trade, profession or service in which, or for the purposes of which, his occupation is followed. It is clear that consideration of the individual's personal occupation has no direct bearing on the classification by industries ; in certain circumstances, nevertheless, knowledge of a person's occupation may help to define the industry in which he is engaged.
- (ii) The main object of *classification by occupation* is to secure a clearly defined appreciation of the particular functions which a person performs. For that purpose the occupational classification of the person is determined by reference either to the processes carried out, the nature of the personal qualifications or skill required, or, in the case of occupations not concerned with the making of material products, the type of service rendered. The nature of the branch of productive activity in which he is engaged, and its organisation into groups of firms and businesses, has *no direct bearing* on the occupational classification.

The tabulation of occupational particulars in conjunction with industry data, as in the following tables, provides a useful analysis of the work force and the nature of its activities. By reading the figures horizontally, the distribution of workers in an industry according to professional, clerical, administrative, operative and other categories is obtained, while the vertical columns show the disposition among the several industries of workers engaged in a particular occupation or group of occupations.

The particulars shown in the tables have been based on information collected at the national census of 1947. They are an abridged form of detailed tabulations for Western Australia, which are available for reference at the Office of the Government Statistician, Perth.

The original data were compiled from the census schedules by the Commonwealth Bureau of Census and Statistics by whose courtesy the accompanying tables are published.
